INTERNATIONAL DAY AGAINST FASCISM AND ANTISEMITISM

The International Day against Fascism and Anti-Semitism is an annual commemoration of the 'Kristallnacht' pogrom that occurred on the November 9th, 1938.



Hundreds of Jewish temples, shops, and homes were attacked and burnt. 267 synagogues were burnt or destroyed. Many of them were soon demolished completely.



Numerous Jews were beaten by Nazi strong-arm squads. At least 91 people were killed and many more were injured.



The Nazi propaganda called the event the Night of Broken Glass (Kristallnacht) referring to the broken glass from the

shop windows. Other names have been used to refer to the event, too, e.g. 'Reichspogromnacht'. The expression 'November pogroms' is now more commonly employed, especially in Germany.



This partly state-organised pogrom against German Jews symbolises the beginning of the Holocaust.

After World War II the Europeans decided that they would never let anything like the Holocaust happen again. Antifascist, anti-racist, human rights, Roma and Jewish organisations commemorate the Kristallnacht, which took place on 9 November 1938.
