

The economic and financial crisis has changed migration flows

The crisis year 2009 has changed the immigration patterns of the world population, according to the OECD Migration Outlook 2011. While after the fall of the iron curtain most workers migrated from the new EU accession countries in the East to the West, the direction has meanwhile changed. The South is again migrating to the North, as it used to be between 1960 and 1970.

This means specifically that 16 states recorded a decrease of immigration levels of between five and 43 per cent. Only Sweden, the Netherlands, Canada, Australia, Russia and the USA presented positive immigration figures. At the bottom of the list is the Czech Republic with a decrease of more than 40%. With a decrease in immigration of 13%, Germany is midrange.

Research shows that inequality - in opportunities, wealth or health, for example - is widespread in Europe and that the citizens of richer countries do not necessarily have healthier profiles than those of poorer countries. The citizens of egalitarian countries, on the other hand, have the highest life expectancy.

New thematic report analyses age discrimination in employment

A new thematic report from the European Network of Legal Experts in the non-discrimination field is now available.

The report considers how the different ways in which the various exception, or potential exceptions, to the principle of equal treatment are phrased in the Directive have influenced national legislation on age discrimination.

The framework of EU law prohibiting age discrimination, as created by Article 19 TFEU and Directive 2000/78/EC on Employment Equality ('the Directive'), is unique in European discrimination law. It provides for a broader range of exceptions to the principle of equal treatment than is permitted in connection with any other protected characteristic. The report is available here:
