More opportunities for young people with the new YOUTH IN ACTION programme

On 25th October 2006, the European Parliament adopted the new "Youth in Action" programme.

The European Commissioner Ján Figel' said that "this new programme aims at encouraging young people to work together to acquire new skills through non-formal education activities, for a common project, for the defence of cultures, for a future of prosperity, understanding and peace. It fosters the idea of belonging to the European Union, and promotes social cohesion and intercultural dialogue, both inside and outside Europe."

During 2007 - 2013, funding support will be given to projects under the following five headings:

- 1. Youth for Europe.
- 2. European Voluntary Service
- 3. Youth of the world
- 4. Youth workers and support systems
- 5. Support for policy cooperation in the field of youth

The participation is open to a wide range of young people, (between 15 and 28 years and, in some cases, between 13 and 30), from European Union and beyond.

Young people & European Citizenship – A Council resolution

Youth was on the agenda of the last meeting of the Education, Youth and Culture Council, which met in Brussels on 13 and 14 November.

At this meeting, the Council adopted a resolution on implementing the common objectives for participation by and information for young people in view of promoting their active European citizenship. By adopting this resolution, Member States have committed to further develop concrete actions to encourage young people's active participation in democratic life.

The resolution supports the idea to set-up a genuine dialogue with young people, structured from the local to the European level around issues of concern to them and to organise the European Youth Week on a regular basis. These are concrete steps towards bringing Europe closer to its young citizens.
